- Do you know your voter ID requirements?
- Are you aware of the candidates, their issues, and local ballot initiatives?

REGISTER TO VOTE AND HELP OTHERS TO REGISTER

2. KNOW YOUR VOTING RIGHTS AND PROTECT OTHERS' RIGHTS

- Should you bring an ID to vote? Check your state's requirements at www.866ourvote.org/state.
- Not fluent in English? Bring a person of your choice (except your employer or union representative) into the voting booth to help interpret. In some jurisdictions, official translated election materials and bilingual poll workers in certain South Asian languages will be available.
- Have problems on Election Day? Call 1-866-OUR-VOTE. Volunteer as an election monitor in a multi-state election protection project. Visit the Election 2012 Center at www.aaldef.org to learn how to be an election monitor.

3. BE A POLL WORKER OR ASSISTANT ON ELECTION DAY
